# CHURCH AT THE DOME - ACTS 16:13-34 - SEPT. 21

## SERMON DISCUSSION GUIDE

### **Read & Pray**

Read Acts 16:13–34. After reading, spend 60 seconds in silent listening prayer. What applications or thoughts about the text came into your mind? Might those be from the Spirit? Close with a prayer to God for wisdom to apply these truths.

#### **Sermon Recap**

Review the sermon with your group, highlighting the following:

- Acts 16 tells us about three people Paul leads to faith in Christ and baptizes ... three types of people: the seeker, the
  captive, and the cynic.
- "The Lord opened Lydia's heart to pay attention to what Paul said ... God creates thirst, awakens interest, and points us to what truly satisfies."
- "Paul turned his back on freedom to rescue the jailer ... an act of incredible, radical generosity that displayed the gospel's power."
- "The gospel unites humanity because at our core, we all share the same problem—sin—and one hope of escape: Jesus'
  death and resurrection."
- "Salvation is not something you do but something Jesus has done ... believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved."

#### **Group Discussion**

- 1. Looking at Lydia, the slave girl, and the jailor, what does their diversity show us about the kind of church God is building?
- 2. Lydia's story reminds us that God opens hearts. How can this encourage us when sharing Christ with friends or family who seem indifferent?
- 3. The jailor was drawn by Paul's and Silas' joy and generosity in suffering. How can our group and church embody that kind of witness today?
- 4. The Resurrection gives confidence, freedom, and hope. Which of these do you most need to remember right now in your walk with Christ?
